Wildcat Girls Basketball 2019-2020 Season Review

The 2019-2020 season saw tremendous team improvement and individual skill development with a team that had very little varsity playing experience coming into the season. This group battled low participation numbers, injuries and illnesses, and an overall lack of team size on its way to a late-season winning streak, a first-round regional win, and an upset bid that came up just short against St. Ansgar who finished in the Top Four at the State Tournament.

This team was 2-7 in early January, but found their stride the rest of the way, winning eight of their last twelve games, including six wins in a row before bowing out of regional play in the second round at the hands of St. Ansgar.

Graduating seniors Kennedy Eastman, Bailey Hoff, and Carly Illian provided great leadership and will be missed moving forward.

The junior class of Chloe Carlson, Gabby Gergen, and Chloe Kiene saw extensive playing time this season and gained valuable experience, and there is hope that Naomi Hovenga (appeared in only two games due to injury) will be able to rejoin the team and make an impact next season.

Sophomores Kassidy Dunbar, Kamryn Umthum, and Cadey Coffman made significant improvement during the course of the season and they will be relied on more heavily in the rotation next season.

A small freshman class of Hope Hovenga and Kali Pletz gained great experience as freshmen by competing with the varsity in practice every day, which can only aid in their development.

Bailey Hoff was a unanimous First Team All-Conference selection. Gabby Gergen was selected to the Second Team, and Chloe Kiene was an Honorable Mention selection.

way he carried himself on the bench. I can't imagine how hard that was for him to sit and watch us play when he knew he could help us reach our goals on the floor. When our journey in 2019 ended at the Sub-State Final, Gil was so overcome with emotion, you would have thought he had been at Janesville his whole life. You would have thought he just got done playing. Gil supported us from the bench the best way he knew how. Gil never let the sideline keep him from being the teammate he was. He bought in to "together" right from the start. "Together" is our motto and our reminder that we need each other to be successful. That we have to be genuine in our praise for our teammates and brothers, and that no matter what, we are in this "together!" As I said before, Gil bought in from the start and did his part as a teammate, as a Wildcat, and for that, I can't thank him enough... When he was tragically taken from us, it certainly had an effect on this team and his teammates. Summer ball was hard. Open gyms were hard. Sometimes just being in the gym was hard. One thing I know for sure, is how badly he wanted to lead this team on the basketball floor. Another one of my fondest memories of Gil came during a spring Sunday Night Open Gym session. Gil had had an AAU tournament out of state all weekend, playing high-caliber basketball games against tough competition. As I got to open gym, I got a text him from him saying he was on his way back from the tournament and would be at open gym as soon as he got into town. Right there, I told myself, "This guy is committed to success." Sure enough Gil was at open gym playing as hard as he could, even after a full weekend of playing aau basketball. After that open gym session, Gil stayed behind for an hour and he and I talked about everything we both dreamed of in regards to basketball and Janesville. After that night, he made it clear he was going to be the leader of this team. He earned it.

Another thing I know about Gil is that he

would have wanted us to succeed without him...and he would have been proud of us. He is proud of what we accomplished. I know that in my heart for sure.

Gil, this 2019-2020 season was dedicated to you. You are a Wildcat for life and I no doubt speak for everyone connected to this team in saying you fuel us every day! We love you! Rest in Peace....

Looking back on this season, we have so much to be proud of on both the varsity and JV levels. We ended the JV regular season with a 15-5 record, picking up some awesome nail-biter victories and improving as a unit every step of the way. One thing I'm incredibly proud of with this group of JV guys was that ability to improve every game. Things early on sometimes looked rough, but these guys work hard every day. We worked extremely hard on not making the same mistakes over and over again, we worked on seeing the floor, we worked on jump-stops and hitting the next man with an extra pass. We started to do simple things like sprint up the court in transition instead of jog. Towards the middle and the end of the season you could see understanding and clear improvement on the floor. There were some nights, the offensive flow looked better on the JV level than it did on the varsity level. This particular group of JV guys shot the ball for the most part, very well, and it often showed in games. Another thing I enjoyed about this group was their ability to play through whatever circumstance came their way. There were some games where JV only had 6 players total. There were times when guys had to play the whole game with no rests besides timeouts and the end of quarters. Aside from the numbers issues, JV often had very little time to work on their own stuff together, because we needed them for varsity prep. A lot of these guys split time on JV/V, so I just want to thank them for going through what they did, because it's not easy to have limited reps with each

other. Everyone who made up the JV squad this year should be proud of the win/loss record, but you should be more proud of THE WAY you guys carried yourselves. To Conner Clubine, Quincy Friedrich, Dawson Dix, Kyler Krieger, Keegan Eastman, Peyton Trees, Andrew Roethler, and Noah Muller, thank you so much for your hard work, I couldn't be more proud of what this JV group accomplished.

On the varsity side of things, right from the start we were doubted by a lot of people who know basketball. After all, we graduated nine seniors from a 19-5 sub-state team which featured a First Team All-State player (Codey Hicks) as well as a player who has the 2nd most assists in school history and broke the school record for assists in a single season (Spencer Hoff). Prep Hoops Iowa picked us to finish 4th in the conference, behind both Clarksville and Dunkerton. In general, nobody in the state expected us to do much this year. To be fair, we were made of up of a lot of young players, but what a lot of people didn't see was this group put in FANTASTIC work last year at the JV level, going 19-1 and setting the tone for future success. We knew we could be good. We knew we could do things nobody expected us to do. In fact our team goals were no different from the year prior: to win the conference championship and to make it to the state tournament. But like any team, doubt is always a factor you have to fight in a given season. Right from the start, our first varsity scrimmage over Thanksgiving Day at Cedar Falls did not go well. We got beat up and down the court for 2.5 straight hours and had many things to be disappointed in or even worried about. I saw a lot of doubt amongst some people. Right now, I can say, I was never worried about us at that point. I scheduled that scrimmage for a reason. It's easy to schedule and line up scrimmages against teams you know you can beat or know you can blow out. That's not how we were going to get better. We needed to challenge and make it hard for ourselves, we



needed to play teams that we know might be BETTER, because it teaches us how to fight. It teaches you how to handle adversity, because in basketball, there is never not adversity...it's just a fact about the game. It prepares you for the tougher opponents we would face later on down the road. As frustrating as it was for our guys, I knew we were okay.

After a couple more weeks of hard work, the season started and after the first 6 games of the year, we found ourselves sitting at 6-0 and ranked in the very first AP poll. As the season would progress we found ways to get big non-conference wins over the likes of Meskwaki, Gladbrook-Reinbeck, AGWSR, and BCLUW. In conference play, although we did not reach our goal of securing a conference title, we were able to do some things we haven't done in several years and achieve some pretty major things in the Iowa Star.

For the first time since the 2015-2016 season, we swept the Dunkerton Raiders, beating them in two thrilling last second comeback games!

1). A quick tangent on that first Home game: There are many unforgettable moments I've had on the basketball court both as a player and a coach, and that night is at the top of the list. Everything about that night was...surreal. There was definitely someone watching over us that night! Amazing!

For the first time since the 2015-2016 season, we beat Don Bosco.

We swept Tripoli in the regular season for the 5th time in 6 years, and ended their season in the district semi-final, completing the overall 3-0 sweep.

In our last year playing on Shelly Sorenson Court, we defended our home court every single night, going a perfect 11-0.

As a group, we saw success in district play, defeating both Kee High and Tripoli in two very completive games, which would secure a spot in the District Final for the 2nd straight year. We ultimately fell short in that game, but not without putting up an *OUTSTANDING* effort against the 1-seeded Turkey Valley Trojans. I've said this to many people, but I don't know if I've been in a gym as loud as that one was that night. It was unbelievable, and I'm so happy and thankful our guys got to experience that atmosphere. More than any one win or any

other effort from this past season, that was the most proud I was of this team. We came in prepared or as prepared as we could be with only one day in between the district semi-final and the final. Not many people predicted us to get to another district final and those close to the game figured TV would blow us out.

We finished with an Iowa Star record of 13-2, and an overall record of 19-5, for the second consecutive year.

On the 100th day of school the kindergarten and first grade children were able to rotate classrooms. The kids were excited to go back to see Mrs. Robbins and Mrs. Anderson for a little bit. It was fun for the first grade teachers to spend time with the kids they would have the following year.

One of my favorite parts of the year was when the fourth graders taught the first graders how to use Encyclopedia Britannica online, including the read-aloud feature, and the first graders gradually became proficient in using it on their own. The fourth graders also built on that experience as they learned more research skills and became comfortable with new resources.

The week before Christmas break we always do a Gingerbread Man book study. We compare the different versions of the Gingerbread Man stories written over the years. The fourth grade students came to our classroom to help our first grade friends build a gumdrop bridge to save the Gingerbread Man from the Fox. It was a great STEM experience!

I'm most proud of my students' growth and comfortability with some of the Leader In Me language. We did a lesson early on in the year about Big Problems vs. Small Problems, and we used the term "Glitch" to describe things that

bother us but don't matter. From then on if someone cut in line, forgot to pick something up, etc., I constantly heard someone say to someone else "it's just a glitch, let's move on." I was so proud to have them adopt this language and other terms so consistently, and on their own!

Our High School Volleyball Team qualified for State for the 10th consecutive season.

Watching students excitement and ownership of new leadership positions was really fun. From Kindergarten to 5th grade we had many students apply for and excel in jobs such as lunchroom helper, morning greeter, recess patrol, and more!

The Science Olympiad team had an excellent year! Anna Gregorsok and Ellie Foelske were the silver medalists in the Crimebusters event and the state champions in the We've Got Your Number event at the state Science Olympiad tournament. At the Ellsworth Community College Regional Tournament, five students won medals: Cael Coffman, Carson Foelske, Braden Friedrich, Ellie Foelske, and Elijah Walters.

One of my favorite events the fourth graders did was the day before Winter Break. We transformed the classroom into

a coffee shop, complete with a stage up front and a scene of a real-life shop projected onto the whiteboard. We had "coffee shop" music playing in the background while the teachers-turned-baristas served everyone hot chocolate, marshmallows, and candy canes. Once everyone was seated, the "open-mic poetry" began on stage. Students took turns sharing all sorts of poetry they had been working on the past two weeks in Reader's Workshop, and got to listen to each other. It was super fun, gave kids a chance to demonstrate their new poetry knowledge in a unique way, and lent a "real life" feel to the project!

The completion of two additions to the building were special. What will always stick out in my mind though is how teachers, para's, administrators, and students set everything aside for a day or two and helped relocate teachers into their new rooms the week before Christmas Break.

The kindergarteners' enthusiasm for research was inspiring.
Students asked so many fabulous questions and passionately worked to explore them! One student told me "I have to take this book home to continue my research," and then several others likewise eagerly asked to continue their work beyond the time we had at school.



My favorite classroom memory was having students bring in pond water, well water, mud pit water, and fresh spring water and examine the specimen under a microscope. The level of excitement, engagement, quality of questions, and their desire to continue learning more was amazing! They wanted EVERYONE to look at what they found under the microscope. The classroom was a buzz!! I'm not sure how many of them will want

to swim in pond water this summer after seeing the specimens that are actually alive in there!

My craziest memory was sending students home for spring break and walking into Mrs. Foelske's room to share how "sad" I suddenly felt. I told her I felt like I just sent the kids home for the remainder of the school year...only to learn weeks later I actually did! #COVID19

Everyone wins for surviving this crazy last couple of months! I'm thankful to have a teammate to share the workload with and learn new platforms with! I don't think I could have done it without Holli!

The law states that they will not be allowed into school without the appropriate immunizations. Welcome to the Janesville Child Development Center!

For children 3 years of age by September 15th and potty trained, there are two options:

- ♦ M, T, Th full day (8:10-3:15). They have preschool in the a.m. and extended care in the p.m.
- ♦ M, T, Th preschool only in the p.m. (12:00-3:15)

For children 4 years of age by September 15th and potty trained, there are two options:

- ♦ M-F full day (8:10-3:15). They have preschool in the a.m. and extended care in the p.m.
- ♦ M, T, TH preschool only (12:00-3:20)

The timeline for registration is:

September-May: Open to children in the Janesville School District, children currently enrolled, and any children who are open enrolled to the district.

May-June: Open to siblings of children currently or previously enrolled.

June 1: Open to everyone.

- ♦ The registration fee is \$45.00.
- ♦ 3 Year Old Preschool (M, T, Th afternoons 12:00-3:15): \$120.00 a month
- 3 Year Old Preschool with extended care 8:15-3:15:\$240.00 a month
- ♦ 4 Year Old All Day Preschool 8:10-3:15: \$225.00 a month.
- 4 Year Old Preschool Only (12:00-3:20): Free
- ♦ The 4 year olds get a grant from the State for 10 free hours of preschool a week.

If childcare is needed between 6:45-8:05 a.m. and 3:15-5:30 p.m., we have a latch key program. You are charged a block rate for each hour the service is used. You will be given a bill at the end of the month. Ms. Horstman is the director of this program. Please contact her to be put on the wait list. Her email is: Kelly. horstman@janesvilleschools.net.

You will not be given a bill for preschool/extended care since you pay a set amount of nine equal payments (Sept.-May). The payments are due the first of each month with a late charge after the 10th.

Your preschool child is welcome to ride the bus within the district in the morning or home when school is dismissed at 3:15, provided there is space available.
