Volleyball 2020

Coach Sorensen:

The 2020 volleyball regular season is wrapping up as we head into mid-October! At the time of this writing, the F/S & JV teams have only one match remaining while the varsity has three more playing dates, including the Conference Tournament, before post-season play begins on October 19th.

Shelly Sorensen, Todd Bengen, and Dana Sorensen are once again the coaches for the Janesville High School Volleyball Teams. There are 24 girls participating in the high school program this season and we have had a great season so far. F/S and JV teams have made much progress and have competed

well in their matches and tournaments. The varsity team is currently 21-2 on the season and are currently ranked #1 in Class 1A. Senior captains Gabby Gergen, Mackenzie Bengen, and Naomi Hovenga have done an outstanding job of leading this Wildcat team. Gabby is averaging 9 assists per set and reached a huge milestone this season as she surpassed the 2000 career assist mark. Mackenzie transitioned from a starting DS in 2019 to being a six-rotation player for the Wildcats this year as an outside hitter and is averaging 2 kills/set along with 3.1 digs/ set. Naomi leads the team defensively, and as the libero is averaging 4.7 digs/set and is serving 93% and leads the team with 26 aces. Seniors Chloe Kiene and Marra Fitzgerald are dominating the middle positions for us, combining for 4.5 kills/ set with the two highest kill efficiencies on the team. Junior Pyper McCarville is also a six-rotation outside hitter for us and is averaging 3.2 kills/set and picking up 2.7 digs/set. Kamryn Umthum rounds out the offense for the Wildcats, playing opposite hitter and Hope Hovenga provides a lot of defense for us in the back row. Izzy Reints, Lauryn Podhajsky, Kendall Thompson, Kali Pletz, Kaylee LaPlant, and Cadey Coffman round out the varsity roster and push the starters during our scrimmages every day in practice.

Regional play begins on October 19th. The pairings are not yet released at the time of this submission, but the Cats are looking



forward to postseason play as we will be working to advance to the state tournament for the 11th consecutive season, and avenge that first round loss at state in 2019.

We thank everyone for your support so far during this crazy Covid-19 2020 season and hope to see you in the stands during postseason play!

Football

Coach Eastman:

"The Wildcats football team is having a pretty successful season. After dropping the season opener against Easton Valley, they have reeled off 5 straight wins and sit in 1st place in District 2 with 1 game remaining in the regular season. Janesville will open the 1st round of the playoffs on Friday Oct. 16th and are looking to make a deep run into the 2020 postseason. The Wildcats are led by captains Carson Pariseau, Joey Carlson and Leo Dodd. All three of them have been exceptional leaders on and off the field. Carson broke the 1000 yard barrier last Friday night and Leo has thrown for over

800 yards on the season. Jared Hoodjer is ranked 2nd in the state in all classes in total tackles."

Playoffs will look different this year as all teams in 8-man football will make it in. I'm expecting us to host a couple of postseason games in Janesville, which will likely be on October 16th and October 23rd, possibly more! These dates will be communicated out and we hope to see everyone at Jack Bolt Field supporting our boys!

Cross Country Coach Hovland:

The third season of cross country's comeback at Janesville got off to a good start with six athletes participating this year. The program added five individuals new to the sport, which is exciting for the future! As the returning letter-winner, conference champ, and 2x state qualifier, Paige Feldmann has provided great leadership this year. Kailey Hjelmeland, Brielle Parkes, and Izzy Weekley are also on the girls team and all have worked hard to improve each meet.

Ethan Hjelmeland is the lone runner for the boys team this year, and he has made great progress especially in the last few weeks. Catalina Westendorf is the first junior high runner the program has had in the last 3 years, so I was happy she joined the team this year.

Since the first meet, runners have dropped a lot of time due to their hard work in practice each day. If all times are added up, there's been an overall improvement of 21 minutes and 13 seconds, averaging out to an improvement of 4 minutes 15 seconds each. Our goal as a team is for everyone to learn something from each meet and apply that lesson to the future.

The season has gone really quickly, as it always does. It's a fun group of kids on the team this year, and I've enjoyed coaching them. With a few meets left, I'm excited to see how well they can perform at the conference and district meets, and hopefully we can extend the season another week!






Welcome to the Janesville Child Development Center!

For children 3 years of age by Sept. 15 and potty trained, there are two options:

- ♦ M, T, Th full day (8:10-3:15). They have preschool in the a.m. and extended care in the p.m.
- ♦ M, T, Th preschool only in the p.m. (12:00-3:15)

For children 4 years of age by Sept 15 and potty trained, there are two options:

- ♦ M-F full day (8:10-3:15). They have preschool in the a.m. and extended care in the p.m.
- ♦ M, T, TH preschool only (8:10-11:30)

The timeline for registration is:

Sept-May: Open to children in the Janesville School District, children currently enrolled, and any children who are open enrolled to the district.

May-June: Open to siblings of children currently or previously enrolled.

June 1: Open to everyone.

- ♦ The registration fee is \$45.00.
- ♦ 3 Year Old Preschool (M, T, Th afternoons 12:00-3:15): \$120.00 a month
- 3 Year Old Preschool with extended care 8:15-3:15:\$240.00 a month
- ♦ 4 Year Old All Day Preschool 8:10-3:15: \$225.00 a month.
- ♦ 4 Year Old Preschool Only (8:10-11:30): Free
- ♦ The 4 year olds get a grant from the State for 10 free hours of preschool a week.

If childcare is needed between 6:45-8:05 a.m. and 3:15-5:30 p.m., we have a latch key program. You are charged a block rate for each hour the service is used. You will be given a bill at the end of the month. Ms. Horstman is the director of this program. Please contact her to be put on the wait list. Her email is: Kelly. horstman@janesvilleschools.net.

You will not be given a bill for preschool/extended care since you pay a set amount of nine equal payments (Sept.-May). The payments are due the first of each month with a late charge after the 10th.

Your preschool child is welcome to ride the bus within the district in the morning or home when school is dismissed at 3:15, provided there is space available.

USDA To Provide Free Breakfast and Lunch for all Janesville CSD Students

USDA has extended the free meal program through the remainder of the 2020-2021 school year.

The free meal program for all students includes one complete meal for both breakfast and lunch, daily. If students are wishing to purchase a second entree or milk, those charges will be applied to their Infinite Campus accounts.

All JCSD students ages 18 and under will be eligible for free meals- breakfast and lunch.

- ♦ Our "in school" lunch ordering procedure will remain the same.
- Virtual Learners are able to pick up meals (pre-order only)
- Students will still be charged for any extra milks or entrees (secondary only)

Free meals will be the only option for lunch other than students bringing their own lunches from home.

If you have any questions or concerns please contact the school office.
